Robinia pseudoacacia 'Unifoliola'



Height	15 - 18 m
Width	8-10m
Crown	irregular broad pyramidal, half-open crown
Bark and branches	twigs olive green to brown, thornless, bark grey-brown, deeply grooved
Leaf	odd-pinnate, 15 - 25 cm, 3 - 7 leaf segments, terminal leaflet to about 15 cm long, green, feathered leaf
Flowers	In pendent racemes to 15 cm, white, about 2 cm, fragrant, June, fragrant flowers
Fruits	flat leathery pod, reddish brown, 5 - 10 cm
Spines/thorns	None
Toxicity	has toxic components
Soil type	few requirements as long as well drained
Soil moisture	suitable for dry soil
Paving	tolerates paving
Winter hardiness zone	5a (-28,8 to -26,1 °C)
Wind resistance	poor to moderate
Other resistances	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), resistant to de-icing salt
Fauna tree	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), resistant to de-icing salt, valuable for butterflies
Application	avenues and broad streets, industrial areas
Shape	clearstem tree, multi-stem treem
Origin	Pépinières Deniaux, Maine-et-Loire, France, circa 1858
Synonyms	Robinia pseudoacacia var. monophylla

Closed, broad pyramidal tree 15 - 18 m high. It is a vigorous grower with a vertical trunk and a squat, irregular crown. The twigs have no thorns. The irregularly shaped leaves hang on a long leaf stem and consist of a strikingly large top leaf (to approx. 15 cm) and 1 to 3 pairs of small side leaves. In the autumn the greyish green leaves turn yellow. 'Unifoliola' leafs out late in the spring and keeps its leaves remarkably long into the autumn. Produces large flower clusters of approx. 15 cm in June. The flowers are white and aromatic. 'Unifoliola' is sensitive to wind. Winter hardiness zone: 5a
