



## Quercus myrsinifolia



<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil moisture</b>	suitable for dry soil, suitable for wet soil
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates no paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	7a (-17,7 to -15,0 °C)
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to de-icing salt
<b>Application</b>	avenues and broad streets, parks, squares, cemeteries, large gardens, small gardens, windbreaks
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem tree, multi-stem treem
<b>Synonyms</b>	Cyclobalanopsis myrsinifolia, Quercus bambusifolia

The Quercus myrsinifolia, also known as the bamboo-leaved oak (formerly incorrectly referred to as Q. glauca), originates from East and Southeast Asia. It is a broad oval to rounded tree with a dense crown that reaches a height of 9 to 12 meters.
