



## Magnolia denudata



<b>Height</b>	6 - 9 m
<b>Width</b>	6-9m
<b>Crown</b>	ovoid to broad ovoid, dark, dense crown, capricious growing
<b>Bark and branches</b>	twigs dark brown, bark grey-brown, rough
<b>Leaf</b>	obovate to broadly elliptical, dark green, 7 - 15 cm
<b>Flowers</b>	white to light pink, about 10 cm, late March/April, fragrant flowers
<b>Fruits</b>	compound capsule, dark green to reddish, seeds have red husk
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	airy, well-drained
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates partial paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	6 (-23,3 to -17,8 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	moderate
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6)
<b>Application</b>	avenues and broad streets, small gardens
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem tree, feathered tree, multi-stem tree
<b>Origin</b>	Eastern and southern China
<b>Synonyms</b>	Magnolia yulan

Medium-size tree with a broad ovoid crown, up to about 9 m. This height is attained only after many years. The tree can grow to over 15 m in the wild. The young twigs initially bear hairs but lose these after the first season. The mature bark is grey-brown and feels rough. The large, vase-shaped flowers are somewhat variable in shape and colour. The petals vary in width. The flowers are usually pure white, but wholly or partially light pink forms also occur. They have a delightful, citrus-like fragrance. The tree blossoms fairly profusely even when young, making it an attractive park tree.
