




## Quercus robur 'Concordia'



<b>Height</b>	6-8 m
<b>Width</b>	6-8m
<b>Crown</b>	round/spherical, half-open crown
<b>Bark and branches</b>	grey
<b>Leaf</b>	yellow
<b>Flowers</b>	greenyellow, flowers in May
<b>Fruits</b>	brown
<b>Spines/thorns</b>	None
<b>Toxicity</b>	usually not toxic to people, (large) pets and livestock
<b>Soil type</b>	loamy soil, sandy soil, acid soil, calcareous soil
<b>Soil moisture</b>	suitable for wet soil
<b>Paving</b>	tolerates no paving
<b>Winter hardiness zone</b>	6a (-23,3 to -20,6 °C)
<b>Wind resistance</b>	good
<b>Other resistances</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind, resistant to de-icing salt
<b>Fauna tree</b>	resistant to frost (WH 1 - 6), can withstand wind, resistant to de-icing salt, valuable for butterflies
<b>Application</b>	industrial areas, small gardens
<b>Shape</b>	clearstem tree, multi-stem tree

Quercus robur 'Concordia' is a cultivar that remains relatively small, reaching a height of 6 - 8 m. The tree has wide-spreading branches and an irregular round crown. The leaves are similar to those of the species but emerge in the spring a remarkable colour of yellow. They remain golden-yellow the entire summer. 'Concordia' is a very beautiful tree that can be used to contrast with green trees. Quite frequently it is planted in parks together with 'Pupurea'. Winter hardiness zone: 5a
